

## How to Teach Poetry Teacher Lesson Plan #4

Course: How to Teach Poetry	Lecture 4: Democratize the Classroom (4 of 15)
TEACHER GOALS	<ul> <li>Who runs the classroom? Who runs the world?</li> <li>Use PowerPoetry's model for a student-lead, democratized poetry class</li> <li>Encourage student participation in the classroom</li> <li>Create a safe classroom space for students to participate and express themselves</li> <li>Teach students to apply leadership and poetry-writing skills to real-world situations</li> </ul>
STUDENT GOALS	<ul> <li>Learn how to direct a class</li> <li>Encourage peers to participate</li> <li>Gain tools for social engagement/interacting with authority figures</li> <li>Use writing skills to make real-world changes</li> </ul>
TEACHER DO NOW	<ul> <li>Have students break off into groups of 3</li> </ul>
STUDENT DO NOW	<ul> <li>In groups students will read PowerPoetry's 6 Tips for Using Poetry in a Speech (<u>http://www.powerpoetry.org/actions/6</u> <u>-tips-using-poetry-speech</u>)</li> <li>Students will choose a topic from <u>http://www.powerpoetry.org/action</u> to write an argumentative piece/mock speech about</li> </ul>
MINI-LESSON/ACTIVITY	Students will use PowerPoetry's



	<ul> <li>Speech Tip Guide to write a mock speech arguing for a change having to do with an area of interest from PowerPoetry's Action Guides</li> <li>The first <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> of class will be devoted to constructing the speech</li> <li>The last <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> of class is reserved for students to present their speech to the class</li> </ul>
